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## **HTI Hosts Annual Summer Workshop**

Not delayed flights, or their subsequent cancellation, were able to dampen the spirits at this year's annual Summer Workshop, held on June 29- July 3. Once again, the event proved to be a wonderful meeting where the new cohort of fellows participated in a variety of workshops carefully designed to enhance their studies. The sixteen fellows were engaged in seminars dealing with writing skills, teaching methodologies, career orientation, up-to-date technology for writers, and others. Several of the leaders challenged the students with assignments that were to be submitted before their trip to Princeton.

This year's lecture, dealing with the controversial topic of the war in Iraq, brought together three speakers from three distinctly different areas of expertise. Carlos Conde, Pulitzer Prize nominee and free-lance journalist, Dr. Hjamil Martínez-Vázquez, Assistant Professor of Religion at Texas Christian University, and Rev. Luis Pérez, who has served as a chaplain in

the armed forces, all gave thought-provoking presentations, sharing their unique experiences. The lectures were followed by comments by **Dr. Luis Rivera-Pagán**, who recently retired from his position as Henry Luce Winters Professor of Ecumenics and Mission at Princeton Theological Seminary. Dr. Rivera-Pagán was honored on Saturday evening with heartfelt tributes given by a host of workshop attendees, from former colleagues to former students. Although no longer at Princeton, Dr. Rivera-Pagán will remain very active, continuing to make important contributions through his writing and guest lecturing as well as his mentoring of HTI doctoral fellows and other PhD candidates at Princeton.

Before leaving Princeton, the attendees were asked to fill out the event's evaluation, leaving written testimony of the workshop's success.



#### **BUSY SUMMER FOR THE HTI COMMUNITY**



Several HTI graduates and current HTI fellows kept their calendars busy this summer, beginning with the **Academy of Catholic Hispanic Theologians of the United States (ACHTUS)** at its 19<sup>th</sup> annual colloquium program at Mount Saint Mary's College, Doheny Cam pus, in Los Angeles, CA. This year's theme of "Building a Latina/o Ecumenical Theology: Protestant and Catholic Theological Perspectives on Some Significant Issues" brought sixty professors and students together. HTI's presence was noteworthy, with nineteen individuals who are current, or past, HTI fellows and seventeen professors who have been members of the HTI Selection Committee, HTI Advisory Committee and/ or HTI Mentors.

**Dr. Mayra Rivera**, HTI graduate and Professor of Religion at Pacific School of Religion, and **Dr. Carmen Nanko**, a past HTI Mentor and Selection Committee Member, began the first session. They presented papers on "Power Relations and Social Issues: Do/Should These Shape and Critique Latina/o Understanding of God?" In the second session, **Leticia Guardiola**, PhD candidate and HTI Dissertation Year fellow, together with **Dr. Jean Pierre Ruiz**, Professor of Hebrew

Bible at St. John's University and former HTI Mentor Trainer, expounded on "Relating Bible and Tradition: Can Latinas/os Do it Differently?" Continuing in session three, **Dr. José David Rodríguez**, an HTI Selection Committee Member, and **Dr. Miguel H. Diaz**, HTI Mentor, presented on "Grace and Justification: How Can We Shape Soteriology and Theological Anthropology a la Latina (Vis-à-vis intra-Latino/a Ecumenical Dialogue?" In the fourth session, **Dr. Juan Martínez**, former HTI Selection Committee Member and Mentor, together with **Dr. Nancy Pineda**, presenting on behalf of Dr. Roberto Goizueta, discussed "Ecclesiology a lo Mestizo/a y Mulato/a: What Happens to Church When We Move Latinamente Beyond "Inherited" Ecclesiologies?" The final presentation was made by **Néstor Medina**, PhD candidate and HTI Dissertation Year fellow, with **Neomi DeAnda**, PhD candidate and HTI Comprehensive Exams fellow, who asked "What Have We Learned? Towards a Latina/o Ecumenical Theology."

On June 14-16, 2007, **Dr. Jesús Rodríguez Sánchez**, HTI graduate and Professor of Pastoral Care in the Inter American University of Puerto Rico hosted **The Society for Pastoral Theology** in San Juan, Puerto Rico. This event gathered over 70 professors and social workers from across the United States and Puerto Rico. The theme for this distinctive conference was "Doing Pastoral Theology in a Post-Colonial Context: Intercultural Models of Pastoral Care and Theology." Dr. Rodríguez also shared his research on "The Emerging Field of Pastoral Theology in Puerto Rico" and the workshops during the conference included the following themes: Towards a Hispanic Caribbean Post-colonial and Macro-ecumenical Pastoral Theology, a Puerto Rican Pentecostal Women's Pastoral Theology, and A Caribbean Postcolonial Hermeneutics. The plenary speaker for this very important conversation was **Dr. Luis N. Rivera-Pagán**, Princeton Theological Seminary's Henry Winters Luce Professor of Ecumenics and Mission Emeritus.

On June 19-27, Dr. Hjamil Martínez-Vázquez, HTI graduate and Associate Professor of History at Texas Christian University facilitated the 2007 HTI/HSP Latina/o Pre-doctoral Conference at Duke University in North Carolina. This conference provides Latina/o masters students who want to pursue PhD studies with guidance on how to apply to graduate studies in religion and theology, learn the intricacies of the application process, and also have ample opportunity to network and ask questions of Latina/o professors. This year Dr. Martínez lead the workshop on Latina/o & Latin American Sources, and Dr. Efraín Agosto, Professor of New Testament at Hartford Seminary, with Dr. Jeanette Rodríguez, Professor of Theology and Religious Studies at Seattle University, led the meeting by disciplines and shared insights in the field of New Testament and Theology and History. In the third session, Dr. Otto Maduro, Director of HSP and Professor of Religion and Society at Drew University, joined efforts with Dr. Agosto to help students identify the differences between applying to a seminary and a university, to discern whether one is ready for PhD studies, and how to select a program. In the Money Issues, Mentorship and Doctoral Work session, Dr. Theresa Torres, HTI graduate and Assistant Professor of Sociology at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, Dr. Daniel Ramirez, HTI graduate and Assistant Professor of Religious Studies at Arizona State University, and Dr. Gregory Cuéllar, HTI graduate and Curator of Rare Books and Manuscripts at Texas A&M University, spoke about financial resources, budgeting, mentoring relationships, and time management. In the final session, Ulrike Guthrie, a freelance editor who has worked for HTI for the last ten years, shared the how to's of academic writing in the Writer's Workshop. Eight students from across the nation and Puerto Rico participated in the conference and were very grateful for these important and valuable conversations and resources.
