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
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## **HTI Book Prize Winner Announced**



Fierce could be a word used to describe the competition for this year's Book Prize as the distinguished readers faced the daunting task of carefully evaluating each excellent work submitted by various publishers. After carefully evaluating each submission while considering the established criteria, the senior scholars unanimously agreed that the entry submitted by Orbis Books and penned by **Rev. Dr. Raúl Gómez** (1999-2000 Dissertation Year fellow) should be declared the winner for his sweeping and multidisciplinary *Mozarabs*, *Hispanics*, and the Cross. Drawing upon years of painstaking research, the work presents original ways of viewing Hispanic Christianity, both historically and geographically. Rev. Dr. Gómez is Vice President for Academic Affairs, Director of Intellectual For mation, and Professor of Systematic Studies at Sacred Heart School of Theology. He will give a lecture on his prize-winning book on Saturday,

August 2, 2008 during HTI's annual Summer Workshop. The respondents will be **Dr. Peter Casarella** (HTI Selection Committee member and mentor), Professor of Catholic Studies at DePaul University, and **Dr. Alberto Hernández** (2000-2001 Dissertation Year fellow and former HTI Advisory Committee member), Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Assistant Professor of History Christianity at The Iliff School of Theology.

The Louisville Institute recently announced the recipients of their 2008 First Book Grant for Minority Scholars. Among the deserving recipients was **Dr. Daniel Ramírez** (2002-2003 HTI Dissertation Year Fellow). Dr. Ramírez received the grant for his work, "Migrating Faiths: A Social and Cultural History of Pentecostalism in the U.S. and Mexico, 1906-1966." He is presently Assistant Professor of Religious Studies at Arizona State University.

In March, **Dr. Juan Hernández, Jr.** (2004-2005 HTI Dissertation Year fellow), Assistant Professor of Biblical Studies at Bethel University, was invited to join the historic North American Executive Committee of the International Greek New Testament Project. He is the first Hispanic to be nominated to the committee in its sixty-year history.



# **Keeping HTI On Speed Dial**

Some time ago, after observing the growing number of gueries fielded by the HTI staff, HTI Assistant Director, Angela Schoepf, colorfully labeled the HTI as having become "the 411 for Latino theological education." This proved evident recently when Dr. Rodolfo Girón, the Director of USA Hispanic Educational Ministries for the Church of God in Cleveland, Tennessee was organizing the First Summit for Hispanic Young Scholars for the Church of God. He called upon recent PhD graduate at Fuller Theological Seminary, Dr. Sammy Alfaro (2007-2008 HTI Dissertation HTI Fellow) who recommended that Dr. Girón invite the director of HTI to attend this event, as well as a few HTI PhD graduates. The main objective of the meeting was to gather students at the Bachelors, Masters and Doctoral level to inspire this young generation of Hispanic Pentecostal scholars to pursue doctoral studies. During the summit, held from May 2-4, three of the five speakers came from the HTI community and they were Dr. Sammy Alfaro, Dr. Loida Martell-Otero (1999-2000 Dissertation Year Fellow), Associate Professor of Constructive Theology at Palmer Theological Seminary, and Joanne Rodríguez, HTI Director. The young audience was rapt with attention as Dr. Alfaro shared his trials and tribulations during his doctoral studies, detailing the moments of doubt in his faith that he experienced when his church community expressed skepticism at his ability to continue serving in the church while pursuing his doctorate. Having struggled with opposing forces was very challenging, but in the end, Dr. Alfaro found his faith strengthened and today believes he is in a better position to educate both parishioners and pastors. He looks to be an organic scholar teaching at a seminary and also leading a church. In addition to adjunct teaching, he is hard at work in establishing a new church development in Arizona.

# **McCormick Theological Seminary Hosts Ground Breaking Event**

Given HTI's commitment to Latino faith communities, there was no hesitation on the part of HTI Director, Joanne Rodríguez, Dr. Edwin Hernández (former officer at the Pew Charitable Trusts), and Dr. Elizabeth Conde-Frazier (2007 HTI Dissertation Fellow), Assistant Professor of Religious Education at Claremont School of Theology, to participate in the Consultation on Latino/a and Asian American Second Generation Ministerial Leadership on May 28-31. This ground breaking event was coordinated by Dr. Luis Rivera Rodríguez (HTI Selection Committee Member and mentor), Associate Professor of Theology at McCormick Theological Seminary, and his colleague, Rev. Virstan Choy, Interim Director of the Center of Asian American Ministries. The gathering brought together pastors, governing body staff members, seminary faculty, staff and students from across the nation to help develop both a healthy ministerial identity and key practices/skills for wise and effective ministry in the following congregational contexts: the second generation church, the multicultural church, and the Anglo church. In convening this group, the hope is to encourage intercultural dialogue, analysis and reflection among leaders of these cultural communities as they face

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different and similar challenges in the formation and preparation of their respective second-generation ministerial leaders. Ultimately, this will help to better equip and sustain second generation Hispanic Americans and Asian Americans in congregational ministry. We look forward to the findings that will help us learn mutually and collaborate across cultures. Thank you, McCormick, for an insightful and excellent consultation.




