Fuller Theological Seminary's Center for the Study of Hispanic Church and Community Celebrates 35TH Anniversary

The Center for the Study of Hispanic Church and Community of Fuller Theological Seminary is celebrating its 35th anniversary this year. The Center offers M.A., M.Div., and D.Min. degrees fully in Spanish and scholarships for Latina/o students. It also serves as the liaison between the Hispanic Theological Initiative Consortium (HTIC) and the Ph.D. program, providing scholarship support and networking for Latino Ph.D. students. The Center serves as the principal driver for the growth in the number of Latina/o students at Fuller. Currently, over 100 students are in the degree programs linked to the Center.

Fuller Seminary has been connected to HTI since the 1990s. Several Fuller students received fellowships through HTI, and Fuller is one of the founding members of HTIC. Currently there are five Latina/o students in Fuller's Ph.D. programs.

In September 2010 the Center will be expanding its course offerings through diversified delivery systems. Courses on several of the seminary's campuses utilizing live video feed as well as online courses will be offered. The goal is for students to be able to complete an M.A. in Spanish through a combination of intensive courses in Pasadena, live video courses at one of Fuller's regional campuses, and online courses.

Currently, there are three Latina/o faculty members at Fuller and the Seminary is conducting a search process for a New Testament professor that will teach in the Center (please see listing under "Career Development" on p. 7). **Dr. Juan Martínez** (HTI Mentor), Associate Dean and Associate Professor, is the director of the Center; Dr. Oscar García-Johnson is Assistant Professor of Theology; and Dr. Lisseth Rojas-Flores is an Assistant Professor of Psychology and Director of Clinical Training in the Department of Marriage and Family of the School of Psychology. Emma Rodríguez is the Center's Program Director in the Center and Arnaldo Soto is the administrative assistant.

The HTI staff is happy to announce the addition of two more fellows to the program's growing roster of graduates:





New in Print & On-Line



Wipf and Stock Publishers announced the publication of two new books. The first, Latinalo y Musulmán: The Construction of Latinalo Identity among Latinalo Muslims in the United States, penned by **Dr. Hjamil Martínez-Vázquez** (2001-2001 Dissertation Year fellow), presents the ways in which Latinalo Muslims construct their identity, as a minority within a minority. Latinaslos are the fastest growing "minoritized" ethnic group in the United States and Islam is one of the fastest growing religions in the United States. This book explores the process of conversion of U.S. Latinalo Muslims and how it becomes the foundation for the re-construction of their U.S. Latinalo identities. Furthermore, since Latinalo religious experience in the United States up until now has largely assumed Christianity as the de facto religion, Latinalo y Musulmán brings a whole new angle to studies in this area. Dr. Martinez-Vázquez is Assistant Professor of Religion at Texas Christian University.

The second book, written by Dr. Oscar García-Johnson, models a creative exercise in ecclesiology based on a Latino/a practical theology of the Spirit, which designs theological discourse based on its encounter with the Spirit in human culture. The Mestizo/a Community of the Spirit: A Postmodern Latino/a Ecclesiology sets forth practical guidelines for implementation of the ecclesial construct in the urban context of devastated communities and offers suggestions for further development in Latino/a theology. Dr. García-Johnson is Assistant Professor of Systematic Theology at Fuller Theological Seminary.





Creating Ourselves: African Americans and Hispanic Americans on Popular Culture and Religious Expression, published by Duke University Press, is a unique effort to lay the cultural and theological groundwork for crosscultural collaboration between the African and Latina/o American communities. In the introduction, the editors contend that given overlapping histories and interests of the two communities, they should work together to challenge social injustices. This is reaffirmed by the writings of several HTI community members, including:

This compilation was edited by **Dr. Benjamín Valentín** (1999-2000 Dissertation Year fellow), Associate Professor of Theology and Culture and Director of the Orlando Costas Latino/a Studies Program at Andover Newton Theological School, and by Dr. Anthony Pinn, Professor of Humanities, Professor of Religious Studies, and Director of Graduate Studies at Rice University.



Dr. Juan Hernández Jr. (2004-2005 Dissertation Year fellow), Assistant Professor of New Testament at Bethel University, has authored several new articles. Three appeared recently in collaborative works of scholarship and one is forthcoming (April 2010) in the peer-reviewed journal, New Testament Studies. These studies continue to pursue questions of interpretation related to the earliest readers and interpreters of John's Apocalypse. The articles include:

- "The Apocalypse in Codex Alexandrinus: Its Singular Readings and Scribal Habits" in Scripture and Traditions: Essays on Early Judaism and Christianity in Honor of Carl R. Holladay.
- "The Apocalypse in Condex Sinaiticus" in Jewish and Christian Scripture as Artifact and Canon.
- "Andrew of Caesarea and His Reading of Revelation: Catechesis and Paranesis" in Die Johannesapokalypse: Kontexte und Konzepte/The Revelation of John: Contexts and Concepts.
