From the Director

In 2001, when we first launched Journeys, it was not only a printed and mailed newsletter, it was also an internal newsletter for masters and Ph.D. students in theology and religious studies. The newsletter was produced once a year and mailed to current HTI fellows, and Latina/o faculty, and it was HTI's venue to keep the scholarly community informed and connected. Ten years later Journeys has evolved into a quarterly online newsletter that currently reaches over 300 faculty across the country, nineteen consortium member schools, and more than a thousand readers in the academy and the church. It is a newsletter that promotes the scholarship and community involvement of HTI masters and Ph.D. graduates, current HTI/HTIC scholars, lectures and new initiatives at the nineteen consortium member schools, recently published books by HTI/ HTIC scholars, and so much more. Journeys not only keeps scholars connected, it showcases the vibrant ecumenical, multi-ethnic, interdisciplinary, academic and church leadership that has been prepared in more than fourteen years to serve in the academy and the church. Drew University Welcomes our Community



The Graduate Division of Religion at Drew Theological School offers a program that is "adventurous within disciplines, flexible across disciplines, and engaged beyond disciplines." The community of scholars that make up the faculty is "distinctively marked by a robust geographic and ethnic diversity as well as an uncommon gender balance." In this diversity the voice of Latinas/os has played a distinctive and important role. Faculty

members **Dr. Otto Maduro** (HTI Mentor) and **Dr. Ada Maria Isasi-Diaz** (HTI Mentor and Selection Committee Member) have worked with many HTI and HTIC fellows and Drew has graduated several Latina/o scholars who are teaching around the United States. Jeffrey Kuan (Drew's representative at HTIC Member Council), the new dean of Drew Theological School, celebrates the connection with HTIC and has already successfully hired **Dr. Elias Ortega-Aponte** (2009-2010 Dissertation Fellow) as Assistant Professor of Afro-Latina/o Religions and Cultural Studies. Dr. Ortega-Aponte, an HTI fellow who completed his doctorate at Princeton Theological Seminary, will teach in both the College of Liberal Arts and the Theological School at Drew. As Dean Kuan noted, "It is a good feeling to make this hire. It strengthens our commitment to the Latina/o

community. Dr. Ortega-Aponte will not only add to the teaching of Afro-Latina/o religions and cultures at Drew, but will also be an important mentor to Latina/o students in the Theological School, the college, and the Graduate Division of Religion."



Dr. Isasi-Diaz retired in December 2009 after 18 years on the faculty at Drew. Known throughout the world for her work on Latina theologies, Dr. Isasi-Diaz brought a strong advocacy for the marginalized to all of her work. She continues to preach regularly on the sidewalk to a congregation that was displaced from its church building in New York City, and to write and publish.

Dr. Otto Maduro, Professor of World Christianities and the Sociology of Religion at Drew, is currently serving as President-elect of the American Academy of Religion. Drew is immensely proud to have Otto leading the largest gathering of religious scholars in the country. Dr. Maduro is also the director of the Hispanic Summer Program, which works closely with HTI to develop potential Hispanic scholars of religion.





This spring, Drew also celebrates with **Elaine Padilla** (2009-2010 Dissertation Fellow), as she completed her Ph.D. Dr. Padilla defended her dissertation with distinction this month and is serving on the faculty of New York Theological School where she is

Assistant Professor of Constructive Theology and Director of Assessment. According to Dr. Catherine Keller, advisor to Padilla, "Elaine Padilla's A Passionate God: Constructing a Theology of Divine Enjoy-



ment, is a joy to read. Developing the classical, especially Thomist, understanding of divine love in dialogue with process thought, Theresa of Avila, Ivone Gebara and Marcella Althaus-Reid. She proposes the model of a God who both suffers with and enjoys the cosmos, a God at once moving and moved."

As Drew looks to the future of global theological education, it is proud to be a member of the Hispanic Theological Initiative Consortium and to contribute to a broader and more diverse community of scholars of religion.

Making Scholarly Connections that Give Voice and Life to a Destitute Peruvian Community

Since the fall of 2005, **Rebecca Berrú Davis** (2010-2011 Dissertation Fellow) has been working on a project with women artists from two art cooperatives in the shantytowns on the outskirts of Lima, Peru. Her research explores ways to link art, faith, and justice while bringing attention to the lives and creativity of these Peruvian women artists. Her fieldwork evolved into an exhibit called *Picturing Paradise: Cuadros from the Peruvian Women of Pamplona Alta*. The exhibit features hand-stitched narratives of the women's realities, their insights, their hopes and dreams. The women call these embroidered and appliquéd fabric pictures *arpilleras* or *cuadros*. Over the past five years the women's art has been shown in a dozen venues throughout the United States. In June 2008, the

art was exhibited in a gallery in Miraflores, Lima, Peru and the women artists were honored with a special reception. A second smaller exhibit called *Stitching Stories of Miracles and Memories* was assembled this past summer and shown at the Dennos Museum in Traverse City, MI, and most recently at Santa Clara University, CA. Both exhibits feature the women's art, raise awareness of the context of their lives, provide a means for the women's "voices" to be heard, and in the process, through sales of additional *cuadros*, help to support over 30 women and their families.

This past fall (2010), two of the women artists and Rebecca were invited by Saint Mary's College, Notre Dame to be part of the conference: *Women as Intercultural Leaders: Imagination, Innovation, Integrity* (September 29-October 1). Julia Liñán Retuerto and her daughter Verónica Principe Liñán were elected by their cooperative, *Manos Ancashinas* to represent the group. During the two-week visit, Rebecca and the artists attended the opening reception presentation for the *Picturing Paradise* exhibit and provided numerous presentations to various classes at St. Mary's and at three other universities. One highlight of the visit to South Bend was preparing a Peruvian dinner for fellow Peruvian, Rev. Dr. Gustavo Gutiérrez at the home of Dr. Timothy Matovina. A dozen other guests from Notre Dame were also invited. That evening the women presented Father Gutiérrez with a special gift – a hand sewn stole depicting scenes from the life of Christ.

Church Planting Success by HTI Fellow

From the beginning of his Ph.D. studies in 2003, **Dr. Sammy Alfaro** (2007-08 Dissertation Fellow), a graduate of Fuller Theological Seminary and now Assistant Professor in Christian Studies at Grand Canyon University, shared that he would always find ways to connect his scholarship to the church. Dr. Alfaro has stayed true to this commitment. In 2008, he and his wife Miriam planted *Iglesia Nuevo Día*/New Day Church in their hometown of Phoenix, AZ. They began the church with eight adults and ten kids meeting every Sunday in their living room. In 2009, the congregation began renting a public school cafeteria where the church has grown steadily, and now has a current average attendance of 100 individuals.

Iglesia Nuevo Día/New Day Church is a bi-lingual, multicultural Hispanic Pentecostal church affiliated with the Church of God (Cleveland, TN). In the past three years, the church has served the surrounding community by preaching the good news of the gospel in word and deed. Dr. Alfaro speaks about New Day Church with lots of enthusiasm and is confident the congregation will continue to grow and to have a greater impact on the immediate community and the greater metropolitan area. Although it is often challenging to teach full-time at Grand Canyon University while pastoring a church, he shared that his praxis as a minister feeds his intellectual endeavors and teaching. Thus, as a pastor and theologian, Sammy seeks to connect his teaching and writing with his Pentecostal roots.



Seminar on Debates Over Religion and Sexuality



Robyn Henderson-Espinoza (2010-2011 HTIC Doctoral Scholar), who is pursuing doctoral studies at Illif School of Theology, is one of the 12 scholars chosen to participate in the Seminar on Debates on Religion & Sexuality at Harvard Divinity School. The selected scholars are advanced doctoral students, recent recipients of doctorates, and writers working outside the academy who are hoping to change the terms of current debates about religion and sexuality. The purpose of the seminar,

which took place June 5-11, was to help participants write their first large project, such as a dissertation or a book, while encouraging them to collaborate with others in the field. To this end, the Debates embraced a broad understanding of "religion" and "sexuality", welcomed a variety of methods in religious studies and theology, and supported the participation of local and international writers. HTI Student Aide Engages High School Students to Think about College and Theological Education



David Coello (2009-2010 HTI Student Aide and Princeton Theological Seminary M.Div. graduate) began an interim assistant pastorate at Laurel Presbyterian Church in Maryland. Soon after, David initiated a book club at Laurel High School for sharing of cultural experiences from book reading. After reading Dr. David T. Abalos' book, *Latinos in the United States: The Sacred and the Political*, Pastor Coello decided to contact the author and organized a visit to

Princeton University, as an opportunity for these young fellows to explore higher education.

On April 26th, 50 students, along with four chaperones, made their inspirational visit to Princeton University and Princeton Theological Seminary where they heard an empowering speech from Dr. David T. Abalos, and **Joanne Rodríguez** (HTI Director). After the visit Rodríguez stated, "Statistics across this nation indicate that Latino and African-American youth have the highest dropout rates; however, on Tuesday morning I had the great fortune of meeting 50 students from Laurel High School, who are bright, energetic and intelligent, proving that media is doing a disservice to our youth. Media continuously portrays Hispanic and African-American youth in a very negative manner instead of highlighting the many exceptional students that we have across the United States."

The visit included a tour of the campus, the opportunity to sit in classes of their choice, and take part in a panel discussion composed of seven students from Princeton University who shared their experiences before and after they became students of the University.

On March 25, 2011, **Neomi DeAnda** (2009-2010 Dissertation Fellow) defended her dissertation at Loyola University, Chicago. Neomi is in the field of constructive theology, focusing on postcolonial thought, U.S. Latina/o theology, and Latin America. After doing extensive research in Mexico, Neomi did groundbreaking research to retrieve the writings of María Anna Águeda de San Ignacio. Her dissertation focuses on God Images in a Theology of Breast Milk through the work of María Anna Águeda de San Ignacio. Additionally, while writing her dissertation, Neomi has taught at Catholic Theological Union and DePaul University, McCormick Theological Seminary, and Lutheran School of Theology. She is an exceptional professor and we are delighted to

have her as an HTI graduate!

Elias Ortega-Aponte (2009-2010 Dissertation Fellow) received accolades from his entire dissertation committee and graduated Magna Cum Laude for his exploration on how Afro-Latino identity together with the practices and projects of the Young Lords Party in New York can serve as a basis for modeling a religious humanism that can guide U.S. Latina/o theology and ethics beyond the politics of cultural identity to a radical politics of dissent. Additionally in mid-May Dr. Ortega-Aponte accepted the position of Assistant Professor in Afro-Latina/o Religions and Cultural Studies at Drew University. Dr. Ortega will begin teaching in September 2011.





Elaine Padilla (2009-2010 Dissertation Fellow) already Assistant Professor of Constructive Theology and Director of Assessment at New York Theological Seminary defended her dissertation on April 6, 2011 at Drew University. Her research, teaching and writing engage the areas of Process Thought, Latina/o Theologies, Constructive Theologies, Postmodern Philosophies, Ecotheology, Gender Studies, and Women Religious Studies. Her dissertation, "A Passionate God: Constructing a Theology of Divine Enjoyment," develops a relational model of the Lover God from feminist, postmodern

and process perspectives on enjoyment. Dr. Padilla is already hard at work on an up upcoming three volume series being co-edited with Dr. Peter Phan of Georgetown University on Theology



Victor Carmona (2010-2011 Dissertation Fellow) was selected as a 2011 Louisville Institute Dissertation Fellowship Grantee. In his dissertation, Victor will develop a theological concept of neighbor love that combines Aquinas's order of charity and Gutierrez's preferential option for the poor to produce a practical moral framework for thinking through U.S. – Mexican immigration issues.

Dr. Sammy Alfaro 2011 HTI Book Prize Winner

Although the work of the HTI Book Prize Selection Committee was quite formidable this year, because of the exceptional books nominated, **Dr. Sammy Alfaro** (2007-2008 Dissertation fellow), Assistant professor in Christian Studies at Grand Canyon University was selected as the 2011 HTI Book Prize recipient for his book *Divino Compañero: Toward a Hispanic Pentecostal Christology*, an original exploration of Jesus as the Divine Companion in a Latina/o Pentecostal context that examines the necessary foundations for constructing a Hispanic Pentecostal Christology.

tology. Dr. Alfaro proposes that Spirit-Christology is a more suitable paradigm for a Hispanic Pentecostal Christology and discusses the components needed to construct such a model. Dr. Alfaro will give a lecture on his winning entry on June 25th during the HTI Summer Workshop at Princeton Theological Seminary, in Princeton, New Jersey. Responding to his lecture will be Dr. Gastón Espinosa (1999-00 HTI Post-doctoral Fellow & HTI Mentor), Arthur V. Stoughton Associate Professor of Religious Studies at Claremont McKenna College, and Dr. Grace Ji-Sun Kim, Associate Professor of Doctrinal Theology at Moravian Theological Seminary. Lecture will be at 7:00 pm and is free and open to the public. *Divino Compañero* was published by Pickwick Publications.

Judson Press recently published *Listen to the Children: Conversations with Immigrant Families/Escuchemos a los Niños: Conversaciones con Familias Inmigrantes.* Making a timely and important contribution, author **Dr. Elizabeth Conde-Frazier** (1997-1998 Dissertation Year fellow, HTI mentor, and Selection Committee and Advisory Committee member) addresses the challenging topic of immigration from the perspective of the roughly 16.5 million children in the United States with at least one immigrant parent, by providing a vitally important and practical resource for pastors, social workers, educators, community groups, legislators, caregivers and others. Dr. Conde-Frazier is dean of Esperanza College at Eastern University, and a prolific preacher and lecturer.

Exploring Worship: Catholic, Evangelical, and Orthodox Perspectives written by Fernando Arzola, Jr., Director of Interdisciplinary Studies and Assistant Professor of Youth Ministry at Nyack College, is a comparative study of the teachings on corporate wor-

try at Nyack College, is a comparative study of the teachings on corporate worship of three major branches of the Christian tradition. Arzola's examination contributes to the important and continuing conversation among Catholics, Evangelicals, and Orthodox adherents of the faith, highlighting the integrative potential between these three groups, contrary to its history of distrust and outright animosity. *Exploring Worship* invites us to more critically, intentionally, and sympathetically reflect on the ways we worship and the place of worship in our churches. It also suggests practices that may help deepen the understanding and experience of worship.

This program will meet the needs of those current and prospective students who are not seeking ordination but understand their vocation in terms of ministry, and who feel the need for an alternative to the traditional three-year M.Div. The degree may be particularly appropriate for those involved in faith-based non-profit organizations, or who are already serving their churches in staff positions other than pastor. of Theology and Hispanic Studies at Duke Divinity School. An ordained minister, Colón-Emeric was chosen after an international search process and will be one of a small number of United Methodist Latino theologians holding a tenure-track faculty position in a United Methodist theological school. In this new position, Colón-Emeric will teach and perform research full-time. Pastor Ismael Ruiz-Millán will replace Dr. Colón-Emeric as director of the Hispanic House of Studies.

Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago

Dr. José David Rodríguez (HTI Selection Committee member), past director of the Hispanic/Latino Ministry Program and Professor of Theology at Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, will become the new Rector at the Instituto Superior Evangélico de Estudios Teológicos (ISEDET) in Argentina. ISEDET's aim is the theological education and the formation of those people devoted to the work of the Church, both in practical training as well as in the field of research. In 2001, the Ministry of Education of Argentine granted full academic standing to for the ISEDET's M.Div., M.A., and PhD degrees. Additionally, ISEDET's library, the most extensive Protestant library of Latin America, adds some 1000 new volumes every year and receives 850 journals from all over the world. It also has Historical Archives in microfilm, which contains sources of Protestantism in the River Plate, a collection of works of the Spanish Reformation (López Library), and several collections given by researchers. 

Additional Meeting at AAR/SBL

Overcoming Barriers to Underrepresented Scholarship: A Strategy and Action Workshop

Despite more than four decades of feminist, anti-racist, queer and other insurgent scholarship, the literature focused on these topics, as well as the scholars who produce it, still face many barriers in the academy. This year, the Status of Women in the Profession Committee, the Status of Racial and Ethnic Minorities in the Profession Committee, and the Status of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Intersex, and Queer Persons in the Profession Task Force of the American Academy of Religion have come together to sponsor a pre-annual meeting workshop focused on developing a plan of action for overcoming these barriers. This workshop will be held on Friday, November 18, from 9:00 am to 4:30 pm. The precise location is yet to be assigned, but will most likely take place near the Moscone Center and several surrounding Hotels in San Francisco. The morning session will feature a panel that will discuss barriers to and strategies for promoting and disseminating paradigm-shifting intellectual projects within the scholarly community. In the afternoon session, participants will work on developing concrete proposals for collective action that can be implemented within the AAR and its home institutions.
